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To the Teacher

The study of history is always more meaningful when it includes geography. These map activities are designed to supplement the study of United States history, and the authors have used them successfully with students of varying abilities. With fifty reproducible maps and worksheets at hand, you can select appropriate activities for able and well-motivated students as well as for less accelerated learners. The number of activities also gives your students ample opportunity to reinforce their historical knowledge and their map-reading and research skills.

If you are using these materials for the first time, here are three helpful tips:

1. The worksheets accompanying the maps are simply suggestions. You should feel free to add or subtract items according to your individual teaching goals, the needs of your students, and the available resources.
2. Before assigning a map, check on the resources available to your students. While most of the necessary information can be found in standard American history texts or classroom atlases, some details may require students to do library research.
3. Many of the activities require students to mark regions and features in different colors. Students will need access to a variety of colored pencils.

We hope that you and your students will find these map exercises useful and enjoyable.




Map 1: Early American Indians and Their Culture




Map 2: Columbus and the New World




Map 4: Colonization in North America




Map 5: Early English Settlement


Map 7: French and Indian War




Map 8: North America in 1763




Map 9: American Revolution


Map 11: Louisiana Purchase and Western Exploration




Map 12: War of 1812




Map 13: Settlement of Northwest Territory




Map 14: Expansion of United States to 1833




Map 16: Texas and the Mexican War




Map 17: Territorial Acquisitions




Map 18: The Way West




Map 19: Mining Regions and Cattle Trails of the Old West




Map 20: War Between the States




Map 21: Overseas America 1867-1940




Map 22: Spanish-American War
