#### To The Student

Although we may read a novel, play, or work of non-fiction for enjoyment, each time we read one, we are building and practicing important basic reading skills. In our ever-more complex society, in which reading has become more and more crucial for success, this, in itself, is an important reason to spend time reading for enjoyment.

Some readers, however, are able to go beyond basic reading techniques and are able to practice higher thinking skills by reflecting on what they have read and how what they read affects them. It is this act of reflection—that is, stopping to think about what you are reading—that this journal is attempting to encourage.

To aid you, we have included writing prompts for each section; however, if you find something that you wish to respond to in the book more compelling than our prompts, you should write about that. We hope you enjoy reading this book and that the act of responding to what you have read increases this enjoyment.

After you read the indicated sections, choose the questions to which you will respond. Keep in mind that there are no right or wrong answers to these prompts, and there is no one direction in which you must go.

# CHAPTER 1

- 1. As the novel opens, Wang Lung's sense of gender roles is clear as he prepares for the arrival of his bride. Make a list of household duties that you feel are female responsibilities and those that you consider male responsibilities. Why do you think certain roles are gender-specific?
- 2. As Wang Lung walks to the House of Hwang, he purchases special foods and visits a barber. He also worries about the appearance of his bride. Imagine you are going to be married. What special preparations and/or purchases would you need to make your wedding day special?
- 3. O-lan stands submissively as the Ancient Mistress relieves her of her duties and describes her as "a good slave, although somewhat slow and stupid," as well as commenting on her lack of beauty. Imagine you are O-lan. Write a diary entry revealing how you feel about how the Ancient Mistress has described you.
- 4. Wang Lung's first days with O-lan are characterized by a mixture of pride and awkward silence. Contrast the marriages in the novel with those of today. Which method do you think is more likely to bring happiness? Why?
- 5. Throughout Chapter One, Wang Lung shows great respect and admiration for his father even though they do not always agree. Describe a conflict you have had with an adult in which you failed to show respect. Do you think a more respectful attitude would have helped in resolving the conflict? Why or why not?

# CHAPTERS 2-3

- 6. Wang Lung and O-lan spend many hours working the soil, "this earth which formed their home and fed their bodies and made their gods." For Wang Lung, the land represents the past, present, and the future. It defines his culture. What is your concept of American culture? What ideals or practices do you think define you as an American?
- 7. O-lan hopes to dress her firstborn son in fine clothes when she presents him to the Ancient Mistress. Once a slave and now a wife, O-lan takes great pride in planning for the baby. What are some accomplishments that have given you a sense of pride? Make a list of at least six things you are proud of and explain why each one gives you pride.
- 8. Wang Lung exclaims, "We shall buy a good basketful of eggs and dye them all red for the village. Thus will everyone know I have a son!" What customs are practiced today to announce births? Do they make sense to you?
- 9. In Chapter Three, O-lan is presented as a woman possessing great inner strength and courage. Write a simile that celebrates someone's strength of character. You may need to look up "simile" in the dictionary.

# CHAPTERS 4-6

- 10. With a strong wife, a healthy son, and a good crop, Wang Lung worries that his life is too fortunate and says, "The air and the earth were filled with malignant spirits who could not endure the happiness of mortals, especially of such as are poor." To ward off possible bad luck, Wang Lung burns incense in the little family temple. What are some common superstitions today? What do people do to keep misfortune from coming their way?
- 11. Wang Lung does not become friendly with his neighbors because he fears they will begin borrowing things from him. Does your family have good relations with your neighbors? Why or why not?
- 12. As the new year approaches, Wang Lung decorates the house with red paper as a symbol of prosperity and good luck. Write a paragraph about how you feel the perfect New Year should be celebrated.
- 13. When Wang Lung and O-lan take the baby to meet the Ancient Mistress, it is extremely important to them that they appear prosperous. In other words, "they dress to impress." Are people judged by the way they dress? Why do you think some clothing styles are more popular than others?
- 14. Write a letter to your school newspaper explaining your thoughts on the emphasis teenagers place on fashion.
- 15. Wang Lung states that "Land is one's flesh and blood." Clearly, he considers land to be his most prized possession. What is your most prized possession? What would you be willing to sacrifice in order to keep it?

- 16. Wang Lung calls his new parcel of land "a sign and a symbol." What does the purchase of the land symbolize to him? What do you feel about having land to own? Is it important?
- 17. Wang Lung's reaction to the news that O-Lan has borne another son is markedly different from that of his firstborn son. Do you find that firstborn children today have advantages over their younger siblings? Explain your answer in a note to a child who complains that the first-born has all the advantages.

# CHAPTERS 7-9

- 18. Frustrated, Wang Lung openly criticizes his uncle, for which he is slapped and reminded of the custom against correcting his elders. Do you agree with this custom? Relate an incident when correcting an elder could have proven beneficial, either from real life, a book, or a movie.
- 19. When Wang Lung's third child, a daughter, is born O-lan says she is "not worth mentioning" and Wang Lung sees the birth as an "evil omen." How do these statements affect you? Why do you think girls carry low social value in China, even today?
- 20. After a season of drought, Wang Lung secretly purchases more land. Think of a secret you have kept. What were your reasons for doing so? Explain them in a personal diary entry.
- 21. After being robbed, Wang Lung states, "They cannot take the land away from me...it is mine." This is a moment of strength for Wang Lung in the face of very bad circumstances. Write about a time when you or someone you know remained strong during a time of great misfortune. Make sure you explain whether you agree with that person's decision.
- 22. When Wang Lung obtains a little food, he feeds his father before he feeds his children. Imagine your family is starving and you do not have enough food to sustain everyone, but you have enough for one person besides yourself. Who would you feed first and why?
- 23. O-lan kills her fourth child, a girl, moments after she is born. Write a letter to O-lan and give her some advice.

- 24. It is implied that Wang Lung's uncle and his wife resort to cannibalism to keep from starving to death during the famine. Write a letter to the editor of the China Times explaining your opinion on the necessity of staying alive by any means or on the horrible idea of eating a human being.
- 25. Despite starvation, Wang Lung and O-lan refuse to sell their land. Imagine you are faced with the same situation. Would you sell your land for food? Why or why not?

# Chapters 10-14

- 26. Wang Lung's weakened family is amazed by the fire wagon that will take them south to the city. What modern technologies amaze you? What do you think are the five most important technological developments of all time? List a one-sentence reason for each choice.
- 27. Passersby ignore the poverty of Wang Lung's family as they huddle beside a wall in the city. Is this typical of people's behavior toward the homeless today? How would you react if you saw a family living in a tent outside your favorite shopping mall?
- 28. The guard at the food distribution center answers Wang Lung's question of why people give to charity by saying "It is the rich and gentry of the town who do it, and some do it for a good deed for the future, that by saving lives they may get merit in heaven, and some do it for righteousness that men may speak well of them." Why do people donate to charities today? Do you think that charitable contributions really help those less fortunate? Why or why not?
- 29. Wang Lung rents a rickshaw and becomes the equivalent of a modern-day taxi driver. As a newcomer to the city, he must learn the ways of the land and the values of the people. Imagine you are starting a new school. What non-academic lessons would you be expected to learn in order to succeed in your new environment?
- 30. Wang Lung's second son proudly presents the family with meat he has stolen. Wang Lung beats him and refuses to eat it. Do you think Wang Lung was correct to punish his son? Is stealing ever justifiable? Write a paragraph explaining your answer.

- 31. Wang Lung feels that his family is caught in a net of poverty and degradation as long as they live in the city. Do you think poor American families face the same situations today? Write up a proposal for a modern family suggesting sensible and legal ways to break the poverty cycle.
- 32. O-Lan and Wang Lung misinterpret both the religious tract they receive from the Christian missionary and the political tract they receive from the Communists. Create a flyer that effectively communicates your opinion on a modern political or religious issue. Make sure that you understand what should go on a flyer.
- 33. Wang Lung narrowly avoids being taken by the soldiers in order to help a war effort he knows nothing about. Imagine you have been taken away from your family to serve in the Army. Write a letter to a loved one explaining what has happened to you.?
- 34. What do you consider to be your "gate of peace"?
- 35. Wang Lung and O-Lan take part in a raid similar to that they suffered before moving to the city. Wang Lung refuses to steal merchandise but takes gold from the rich man who was left behind, even threatening his life. What would you have done in this situation if you were Wang Lung?

# CHAPTERS 15-16

- 36. Ching weeps when Wang Lung gives him seeds to start replanting, and a lifelong friendship is sealed. Construct a list explaining what qualities make a longstanding friendship.
- 37. Do you have a friend now that you can visualize being your friend twenty years from now? What experiences do you predict you will share with this friend?
- 38. With their newfound wealth, Wang Lung and O-lan make several small home improvements. Imagine you are given \$500 to make improvements in your room. What items would you buy? Make a collage from catalog clippings of the items you would like and be sure not to spend more money than your budget allows.
- 39. After Wang Lung discovers O-lan's jewels, he demands all of her treasure except two pearls. He then buys three hundred acres of prime farmland from the House of Hwang, ensuring a secure future for the family. In today's society, what items make a person feel secure? Why?

# CHAPTERS 17-19

- 40. As Wang Lung amasses land and wealth, he sends his oldest son to school because he feels he needs a family representative capable of reading contracts. What aspects of education today do you think are the most important? What parts do you feel are least important? Explain your position.
- 41. Wang Lung chooses a school for his sons based on the teacher's reputation for flogging inattentive students. Should children be physically disciplined in school? What punishments, if any, do you think are most effective for kids who do not follow school rules?
- 42. Wang Lung complains about O-lan's physical appearance. Imagine you are O-lan and write a diary entry in response to Wang Lung's complaints. Remember that no one is supposed to read your diary but you, so be honest about how you feel.
- 43. In Wang Lung's time, foot binding was a painful method of altering the body for the sake of what some call "beauty." What do women today to be considered more beautiful? What do men do to be considered more hand-some?
- 44. Obsessed with Lotus, Wang Lung endangers his family's well being with silly spending. He also neglects the management of his property and changes his appearance and manner of dress. Discuss how adolescents alter their personalities for the sake of love. Why do you think this happens?

# CHAPTERS 20-23

- 45. An angered O-lan cries out to Wang Lung, "I have borne you sons...I have borne you sons." Write a poem of at least ten lines that expresses the anguish and betrayal that O-lan feels.
- 46. Wang Lung describes his obsession with Lotus as a fever or sickness. How do you feel about the choices Wang Lung has made regarding the concubine? Do you see his actions as a sign of strength or weakness of character?
- 47. Wang Lung has amassed enough property to become a respected member of the town. His advice is sought in a number of civic and political matters. Imagine you have just been elected to the position of city planner for your hometown. Write an editorial for the local paper listing at least three improvements you would propose for your area. Be sure to include arguments why these proposals are necessary.
- 48. Wang Lung beats his oldest son for skipping school. Do you think this punishment is appropriate? What expectations or rules are maintained in your family? What consequences do you think would be most effective in helping you live by these rules? Which rules in your family would you want to change? Why?
- 49. When Wang Lung attempts to oust his uncle's family from the household, his uncle reveals that he is a member of a gang of thieves. Wang Lung feels helpless in this situation. Recall a time when a bully confronted you or someone you know. How was the conflict resolved?

# CHAPTERS 24-27

- 50. Wang Lung's eldest son wishes to continue his education in the city rather than staying on the farm with his family. Wang Lung is incensed by his request. Imagine you are Wang Lung and write a letter to your son stating the reasons why you think he should remain at home. OR Pretend you are the eldest son and write a letter stating your position.
- 51. Wang Lung decides that his second son should become a merchant. Toward what careers are your parents or guardians guiding you? Do you feel pressured by their influence, or do you appreciate their guidance? Do your own goals differ from the goals your parents have set for you? Include these answers in a letter to the people who are trying to steer you toward a career.
- 52. When Wang Lung shows concern for his younger daughter's pain as she undergoes the foot binding process, she responds, "...my mother said I was not to weep aloud because you are too kind and weak for pain and you might say to leave me as I am, and then my husband would not love me even as you do not love her." Do you think O-lan loves Wang Lung? Why or why not?

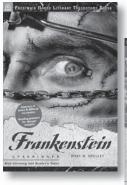

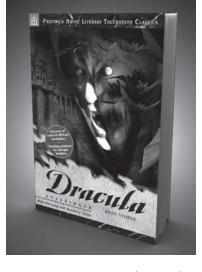
