#### To The Student

Although we may read a novel, play, or work of non-fiction for enjoyment, each time we read one, we are building and practicing important basic reading skills. In our ever-more complex society, in which reading has become more and more crucial for success, this, in itself, is an important reason to spend time reading for enjoyment.

Some readers, however, are able to go beyond basic reading techniques and are able to practice higher thinking skills by reflecting on what they have read and how what they read affects them. It is this act of reflection—that is, stopping to think about what you are reading—that this journal is attempting to encourage.

#### CHAPTER ONE

- 1. After agreeing to supervise the children, the train porter leaves Marguerite and Bailey alone on the train. Put yourself in Marguerite or Bailey's place. What are you thinking or feeling when the porter leaves?
- 2. Marguerite remembers the early mornings at the store and her grand-mother's morning prayers. Can you remember a beautiful early morning scene you experienced? If you can, describe what the morning was like and how you felt about it.
- 3. The cotton workers have a difficult life. Have you witnessed or heard about a job that you think is a difficult or unpleasant way to make a living? What can you do to avoid working at such a job?

#### CHAPTER TWO

- 4. Momma makes a point of telling everyone she meets that Uncle Willie "wasn't born that way." Imagine you are Uncle Willie; describe how you feel hearing her explain this problem.
- 5. Uncle Willie hides his disability behind the counter and sometimes pretends to strangers that he isn't crippled. Assume you are Willie, and Marguerite asks you why you pretend like that. Write the answer you give her.

#### CHAPTER THREE

6. In Stamps, it is assumed that black people will go to heaven since they suffer here on earth. They endure their lives with the promise of an eternal reward. What are your thoughts or feelings on the idea that having a difficult time while alive assures a place in heaven?

7. The sheriff angers Marguerite. She does not think he deserves credit from God for trying to warn Willie of the possible trouble. Write a letter to God, from Marguerite, explaining why you are angry.

#### CHAPTER FOUR

- 8. The author mentions Mr. Elroy as an example of a successful black man. In your mind, what makes any man or woman a success? What plan would you follow to be that kind of success?
- 9. Bailey is Marguerite's hero. Is there a real person in your life you admire and want to be like? Relate the heroic qualities of this person.
- 10. The white people Marguerite encounters are almost like foreigners. She is interested in them and their strange lives. Assume you are visiting from China. What things might a visitor from China find strange about your life?

#### CHAPTER FIVE

- 11. It is insulting to Mrs. Henderson when the white people call her Annie. Can you think of a time when you or a friend felt deeply insulted? Describe how you felt.
- 12. Momma sings to herself whenever she faces a difficult situation. How do you feel about this as a way to handle a difficult situation?
- 13. Marguerite tells Momma she loves her and is proud of her by making a large heart in the dirt of the driveway. In what ways, other than words and physical expressions, have you seen someone show love to another person?

#### CHAPTER SIX

- 14. Because of his actions, the children are disgusted by the Reverend Thomas. Write a letter of advice from the children to Reverend Thomas on how to behave when he is a guest in another person's home.
- 15. Sister Monroe behaves outrageously because she wants everyone to be impressed with her devotion. Tell about someone you know who tries to impress others through behavior.
- 16. Marguerite and Bailey begin to laugh in church. Have you ever felt the urge to laugh in an inappropriate situation? Describe what happened.

#### CHAPTER SEVEN

17. Momma tries to teach the children how to deal safely with white folks. As a parent, what advice would you give your children about dealing with other people who are different?

#### CHAPTER EIGHT

- 18. In Marguerite's world, when blacks give to blacks, it is a "true gift" because the item is needed by both. Write about a "true gift" you have received or witnessed another receive.
- 19. Bailey and Marguerite are upset by the Christmas gifts from their parents. Write a note from Marguerite to her mother telling her exactly how she felt about receiving the gifts.
- 20. Bailey hopes his mother will come to see them. He wants her in his life. Assume you have a friend who is separated from his mother at the holidays. What advice would you give him or her?

#### CHAPTER NINE

- 21. The children leave their home in Stamps to travel with their father to St. Louis. There they will be staying with their mother. Write about a time in your life when you moved to a different place. What was the best or worst thing about the move?
- 22. Marguerite is confused and amazed by the behavior of her parents and the way in which their personalities differ from hers. Are there things about your parents' personalities that amaze you? Explain what these things are and why they surprise you.
- 23. Daddy Bailey tries to talk to Marguerite and make friends with her but is not really successful. Write a letter from Daddy Bailey to Marguerite expressing how he feels when she doesn't respond to his efforts.

#### CHAPTER TEN

- 24. Uncle Tommy tells Marguerite, "Don't worry cause you ain't pretty. Plenty pretty women I seen digging ditches or worse. You smart. I swear to God, I rather you have a good mind than a cute behind." What is your reaction to Uncle Tommy's comment?
- 25. Marguerite says, "But what mother and daughter understand each other, or even have the sympathy for each other's lack of understanding?" Write about a time in your life when your mother didn't understand you. How did you try to help her understand your point of view?

#### CHAPTER ELEVEN

26. Marguerite experiences sexual abuse by Mr. Freeman. If this were to happen to one of your friends, how would you provide comfort? What advice would you give?

27. Some people say that if you never had the experience you can't give advice; others say it is frequently the outside observer who can give the best advice. What is your opinion on giving advice?

#### CHAPTER THIRTEEN

- 28. In the trial of Mr. Freeman, Marguerite lies on the witness stand. Assume she keeps a daily diary and write her entry for that day, describing how she feels about lying.
- 29. If you understand why Marguerite stopped talking, explain it to a friend who doesn't understand Marguerite's behavior.

#### CHAPTER FOURTEEN

- 30. Marguerite learns from the people in Stamps to "be satisfied with life's inequities." For example, she learns to accept the unfairness of the rape. What do you suppose are inequities in life that you have learned or must learn to accept if you are to be happy?
- 31. Marguerite is described by the community as "tender-hearted" or sensitive. Do you know someone who is "tender hearted?" Are they understood or misunderstood by others?

#### CHAPTER FIFTEEN

32. Write a letter to Mrs. Flowers from a grown-up Marguerite expressing why she admired Mrs. Flowers and how the woman helped shape her life.

- 33. Momma embarrasses Marguerite by making her take off her dress in front of Mrs. Flowers. Can you remember a time when a member of your family embarrassed you? Can you remember being a young child and feeling embarrassed by your parents? Describe the incident, including why you were embarrassed.
- 34. Mrs. Flowers helps Marguerite understand that sometimes a person can be illiterate but still very intelligent. Can you think of someone you know or have heard about who lacks any formal education but is very intelligent and successful? Describe this person.
- 35. Marguerite is punished for using the phrase, "by the way." While the phrase is a common expression among the white people, the black people interpret it as using the Lord's name in vain. Have your parents ever gotten upset over something you said, acceptable among your peers but offensive to them? Did they listen to your explanation?

#### CHAPTER SIXTEEN

36. Marguerite tries to understand her employer, Mrs. Cullinan, who is very bigoted. Do you know anyone well who is prejudiced? Why do you suppose that person is that way?

#### CHAPTER SEVENTEEN

- 37. Bailey is late returning from town, and Momma is worried. Write about a time you were late coming home. How did your family feel? Did you suffer any consequences?
- 38. Bailey brings comic books back for Marquerite. What are some of your favorite comics? Why do you prefer these over others?

39. On the way home, Bailey plays chicken with a train. Marguerite is terrified. Suppose you are walking home with a friend and he or she decides to do something dangerous. What would you do or say to stop it?

#### CHAPTER EIGHTEEN

- 40. The revival meeting is a joyous experience for all the different churches in the black community. Can you relate a time when you attended an enjoyable community event?
- 41. The sermon excites the people because it suggests that they are almost guaranteed a place in heaven since they truly understand the idea of charity. Write a letter to God asking him if he really admits only poor, downtrodden people into heaven.

#### CHAPTER NINETEEN

42. The black community places a lot of responsibility on Joe Louis to win the heavyweight title. He is fighting for the honor of the entire race. Write a dialogue between Joe Louis and his trainer in which the trainer is trying to persuade him to train even harder for the upcoming title fight.

#### CHAPTER TWENTY

- 43. Louise quickly becomes Marguerite's best friend. What qualities do you look for in a friend? Why is this person fun to be with?
- 44. Explain to Marquerite what being a Valentine is supposed to mean.

- 45. Once Marguerite trusts that Tommy likes her, she gets the giggles every time he is around. Have you ever behaved foolishly around someone you wanted to impress? Describe what you did.
- 46. Louise advises Marguerite not to answer the Valentine and Tommy will go away. What advise would you offer a friend in the same situation?

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-ONE

- 47. What do you think of Joyce and what she does to Bailey? If you were Marguerite, what would you say to her?
- 48. The activities in the Captain Marvel tent are a secret from Momma and Uncle Willie. Suppose Momma discovers what Bailey is doing. Write a dialogue between Momma and Uncle Willie in which she is trying to convince him to have a talk with Bailey.

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-TWO

- 49. The children are frightened by Brother Taylor's story about talking to his wife's ghost. How do you feel about ghosts and ghost stories? Write about a time when you had become that involved by a ghost story.
- 50. Marguerite understands the inevitability of death for the first time at Mrs. Taylor's funeral. Describe a time you attended a funeral, and it caused you to think about life and death.
- 51. During the ghost story, Marguerite thinks the familiar rooms behind the store are suddenly spooky. Relate a time you felt scared in your own home.

52. Momma's wisdom at solving Mr. Taylor's problem clears away the ghostly feel of the house. As a parent, what advice would you give to your children to make them feel safe?

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-THREE

- 53. Marguerite admires Henry Reed. He is popular with adults and children. Do you know anyone like this? What special qualities does this have?
- 54. The song "Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing" reminds the children of how much the black race has already endured. Marguerite is proud to be black. Write a note from Marguerite to Henry describing her appreciation of his graduation speech.

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-FOUR

55. Marguerite suffers with a toothache and needs to go to a dentist. Is there a trip to the dentist that you remember? Relate how you felt, the sounds and smells in the office, and the resolution of your problem.

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-FIVE

56. Marguerite says that she uses books to escape the realities of her life and that these are experiences she will never lose. Have you ever escaped from reality when reading a book? Can you think of anything the book did besides help you escape reality?

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-SIX

- 57. When in the car with their mother, Marguerite and Bailey realize that their mother is nervous around them and that they have the power to upset her. What kind of power do you have over your parents? Do you use your power fairly or unfairly?
- 58. The children's mother shoots her partner because he calls her a name. The author tells about this incident as a way of explaining Momma's attitude. The story doesn't include any information about what the police do or if she is punished. Speculate on what happened and how she avoided jail time.
- 59. Marguerite and Bailey are introduced to different cultures by going to different restaurants and tasting their food. We have all had the experience of being served something strange at someone's house or in a restaurant. Relate a time when you were served something unusual.

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-EIGHT

60. Miss Kirwin is Marguerite's favorite teacher. What qualities does the ideal teacher or your favorite teacher possess?

#### CHAPTER TWENTY-NINE

- 61. Marguerite is exposed to colorful characters who tell her tales of their adventures. Can you think of a story told to you by an older relative or acquaintance that was interesting, but may not have been true?
- 62. Marguerite lives in two worlds. She knows how to speak the school language and then slip into the colloquial slang around the neighborhood. If you or someone you know does this, explain to someone who doesn't understand why having two languages is necessary.

#### CHAPTER THIRTY

- 63. Marguerite doesn't get along with her stepmother. Write about an experience in your life or in a friend's life in which the stepmother and children do, or do not, get along.
- 64. Baily Jr. seems to enjoy the conflict between Marguerite and her stepmother. Write a dialogue between Marguerite and her father in which she explains how she feels about his attitude.
- 65. In Mexico, Marguerite sees another side of her father. She sees him with "new eyes." Write about a time in your life when an adult surprised you, and you saw him or her with "new eyes."
- 66. Marguerite must drive for the first time when her father passes out in the back seat of the car. Have you ever experienced the situation in which, when a job had to be done, you or someone else stepped forward because there was no one else to do it?
- 67. Marguerite is angry that her father has recovered so quickly and disappointed that he doesn't appreciate the greatness of her achievement. Have you ever done something noteworthy, only to find it totally unappreciated by your friends and family? Do you remember how you felt?

- 73. When Marguerite goes to visit Bailey, she discovers he has already made up with their mother. Write a dialogue between Bailey and his mother in which they both decide it is best for him to get a job on the railroad.
- 74. Bailey's mother comes through for him and helps him get a job. She doesn't hold a grudge about the fight. Write about a time in your life when you had a fight with a friend or family member. How did you resolve your differences?

#### CHAPTER THIRTY-FOUR

- 75. When Marguerite sets out to get "an impossible job" as a conductor on the street cars, her mother encourages her to try. Do you feel that your parents encourage you to try new or difficult things?

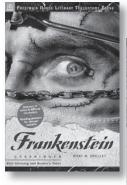

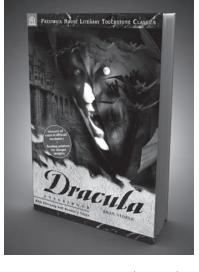
