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Response Journal

To The Student

Although we may read a novel, play, or work of non-fiction for enjoyment, each time we read one, we are building and practicing important basic reading skills. In our ever-more complex society, in which reading has become more and more crucial for success, this, in itself, is an important reason to spend time reading for enjoyment.

Some readers, however, are able to go beyond basic reading techniques and are able to practice higher thinking skills by reflecting on what they have read and how what they read affects them. It is this act of reflection—that is, stopping to think about what you are reading—that this journal is attempting to encourage.

To aid you, we have included writing prompts for each section; however, if you find something that you wish to respond to in the book more compelling than our prompts, you should write about that. We hope you enjoy reading this book and that the act of responding to what you have read increases this enjoyment.

After you read the indicated sections, choose the questions to which you will respond. Keep in mind that there are no right or wrong answers to these prompts, and there is no one direction in which you must go.

Chapter One

1. Old Major is highly respected and looked to for guidance by all the animals on Manor Farm. Write a paragraph describing a public figure you admire.
2. The animals reflect upon the significance of their lives. Take a moment to contemplate the purpose of human life. Create a diary entry giving your opinion about the meaning of life.
3. In his speech to the animals, Old Major states, “The life of an animal is misery and slavery.” Write a letter to your local SPCA discussing the problem of cruelty to animals and overpopulation. Do you believe they are being handled adequately, or do you feel more needs to be done?
4. Man is condemned as being the root of all the animals’ problems. Imagine you are in a debate with Old Major. Write a defense for mankind based upon Old Major’s accusations about us in *Animal Farm*. Be sure to include any advantages animals gain from being cared for by humans.
5. The animals anticipate a time of revolution against mankind. Write about a historical political revolution. What were the circumstances surrounding the event, and do you feel the revolt was justified?

Chapter Two

6. Old Major's speech gives the animals "a completely new outlook on life." Describe a speech or an event in your life that gave you a new perspective on something.
7. The pigs assume leadership because they are the cleverest animals. Make a list of ten qualities you think a good leader needs to possess. Which trait of the ten do you believe is the most important? Why?
8. Moses is disliked because he tells tales and does not work. Write about a character from a book or movie that you don't like because he or she is dishonest.
9. The horses, Boxer and Clover, completely accept the pigs' leadership on blind faith. Did you or someone you know ever accept something without fully understanding it? Explain.
10. After a long period of not being fed, the animals rebel against Mr. Jones. Describe a time when you or someone you know was pushed to the limit either physically, scholastically, or temperamentally. What was the result?

11. The animal rebellion terrifies the men and causes them to leave the farm. Think back to a time when you were frightened by someone. Write a letter to that person and explain how the fear made you feel.
12. The animals are both incredulous and ecstatic that the rebellion is successful. In a letter to a friend, describe a time you were proud of an acquired goal. How much effort did you use, and by what means did you accomplish your goal?
13. After seizing control of the farm, the animals make an inspection and find “it was as though they had never seen these things before.” Complete the following dialogue by explaining to a friend, who doesn’t understand, why the animals have a fresh outlook on the farm.

Friend: How can the farm seem new if the animals have lived there their entire lives?

You: The farm seems new because...
14. Imagine you have a pen pal in another state or country. Write a letter in which you describe your town. What aspects of where you live are you most proud of?

15. The seven commandments are created for all the animals to follow. Compose a list of ten rules you believe all people need to follow. Do not copy from the Ten Commandments, but you may rephrase them. How does your list differ from that of the animals? Across from each rule, write a short sentence that either provides a reason for that rule or gives a proper punishment for breaking it.

Chapter Three

16. The pigs supervise and the direct the work of other animals. Why do you suppose it is so easy for the pigs to assume control over the others? How does this relate to Joseph Stalin's reign?
17. The animals appreciate their food more because they produce it themselves. Write a letter to the editor of a newspaper discussing something you feel Americans take for granted. Are you included in this group?
18. Boxer receives more duties for being the most dedicated and hardest working animal on the farm. Describe a situation from a book, movie, or real life where someone is taken advantage of by being rewarded for good work with more responsibilities.
19. List at least three comparisons between *Animal Farm* and the Russian Revolution that you have found so far.

20. Napoleon and Snowball argue over whether to spend more time training the young or old animals. Napoleon insists “the education of the young was more important than anything that could be done for those who were already grown up.” Which side do you agree with, and why?
21. The animals are told it is for their own welfare that the pigs receive all the milk and apples. Have you ever felt taken advantage of by another? Write a diary entry written by the person who took advantage of you.

Chapter Four

22. The neighbors of Animal Farm are in disbelief of the animal rebellion and think it is ridiculous. Why do you think this is so? Write a letter to a friend describing the most ridiculous, real-life event you have ever heard about.
23. Pilkington and Frederick are frightened by the animal rebellion. Although Animal Farm is well managed, the men call the rebellion unnatural and insist the animals cannot survive. Write a paragraph about a time you or someone you know had trouble accepting a change. Why do you suppose some people have difficulty with change?
24. The men wage war against the animals in an attempt to regain control. Create a list of as many countries as you know about in which wars are going on today. Does this tell you anything about human nature? When do you believe war is justifiable?

25. The flag and *Beasts of England* are symbols used to unite the animals under a common cause. Symbols help people understand difficult concepts. The U.S. flag is a symbol of patriotism, and it brings up many strong feelings. Write a letter to the editor of your school newspaper explaining your thoughts about people who burn the American flag.
26. Snowball and the sheep are proclaimed as heroes for their fighting at the Battle of the Cowshed. Compose a paragraph about someone you consider a hero or about a role model you have. What character traits do you admire in this individual?

Chapter Five

27. Clover doesn't know how to react when she catches Mollie conversing with a human. Put yourself in Clover's situation. Imagine you catch a friend talking to an enemy. What would you do?
28. Mollie's vanity causes her to leave Animal Farm and go somewhere where she will be pampered. Describe someone from a book, movie, or real life who is conceited. What is your opinion of this sort of person?
29. Snowball and Napoleon disagree about everything concerning Animal Farm. Is there a person you don't always agree with or have gotten into an argument with? Explain the situation. What advice would you give to Snowball and Napoleon?

30. The animals use a voting method to make choices concerning Animal Farm. Write an editorial for your local newspaper titled, “The Word of Democracy.” In it, discuss your viewpoint of a democratic government in countries that do not have this form of government now.
31. Napoleon uses his militaristic dogs to chase Snowball away and seize control of Animal Farm. Write a paragraph for a history textbook about a similar event in world history in which a country was seized by a dictator.
32. Napoleon slanders Snowball’s past bravery and good deeds. As a result, Snowball loses his prestige among the animals. Relate an incident from real life, a book, or a movie when a person is falsely accused of something and, as a result, is shunned by others. Examples could be politicians, people convicted of crimes, your unpopular classmates, or even yourself.

Chapter Six

33. A heavier workload is given to the animals. Although the additional hours are voluntary, “any animal who absented himself from it would have his rations reduced by half.” Describe a rule or law you believe is unfair. Why do you feel this way? If given the chance, how would you revise it?

34. Imagine that you are Mr. Jones. Write a letter to the new leaders of Animal Farm explaining how you could help them.
35. In your opinion, how much influence does the media have on individuals and society? What do you see in the media or on television that you disagree with? Explain your answer.
36. The collapse of the windmill represents the trials communist Russia faced to establish modern industries. Compose a letter to a friend describing the hardest goal you have ever endeavored to attain. What obstacles did you meet?
37. Take a moment to think about the many differences between capitalism and communism. Write a paragraph giving your opinion of the two economic systems, and state which system you most agree with. Support your answer.
38. Relate a time you or someone you know failed at reaching a goal but continued to try again. Was the goal accomplished? Do you set goals for yourself? Make a list of five short-term goals (those you want to achieve within a year) and long-term goals (those you want to accomplish within ten years).

Chapter Seven

39. The animals begin to go hungry as food rations are cut. People, too, are suffering from life threatening dangers such as hunger. Compose a letter to the President of the United States explaining what you think should be done to help end hunger in this country and also globally.
40. The hens go on strike because they feel they are being treated unjustly. Recall a strike you heard about in real life, and write a paragraph describing it. What were the events leading to the strike? Do you feel a strike was necessary, or were there other ways to settle the matter?
41. Compose a letter to the editor of a local newspaper in which you discuss your opinion of labor unions. What are the advantages and disadvantages of a union for both the employee and the business?
42. The pigs claim Snowball is to blame for all the mischief on Animal Farm and, even though Snowball is not there, the animals believe he is guilty. Why do you suppose some people are easily persuaded? Do you know anyone who is gullible? Explain. Why, in your opinion, is it easy to blame someone who is not present?
43. The animals are frightened of Snowball's "invisible influence, pervading the air about them and menacing them with all kinds of dangers." Remember a time when you were younger and create a diary entry for the night that someone told you a story that frightened you.

45. The commandments are changed to suit the pigs' behavior. Revise some of your school's rules so that they suit you more. Next to each item, give a short reason the existing rule needs to be changed.
46. Some animals are executed on the spot if they are guilty of a crime. Write a paragraph about your feelings on the death penalty. Do you feel it is ethical? If so, for what crimes should anyone receive the sentence? If not, explain your answer.
47. The animals' memories are weak, and they easily forget past events and rules. Write a letter to an imaginary friend describing your earliest memory. It might begin:

Chapter Nine

51. A class system is established on Animal Farm. The pigs' lives are lavish compared to that of the other animals' hard conditions. Explain the different classes you see in the United States. Does any class take advantage of another? Support your answer.
52. If you were an animal living on Animal Farm, which would you prefer: living a hard life free from the rule of man, or living a comfortable life under the rule of man? Defend your opinion.
53. The pigs take pride in wearing green ribbons on their tails every Sunday. Describe something in your life that you take pride in, whether it's a talent, a possession, or something else. Do people who show off by what they wear bother you? Explain.
54. Moses describes Sugarcandy Mountain as "that happy country where we poor animals shall rest for ever from our labors." What do you think Moses and Sugarcandy Mountain represent?
55. Boxer forces himself to work hard every day until he finally collapses from exhaustion. If there were a contest for the hardest working person you know, whose name would you submit? Write a letter to the contest committee explaining why this person deserves to win the contest.

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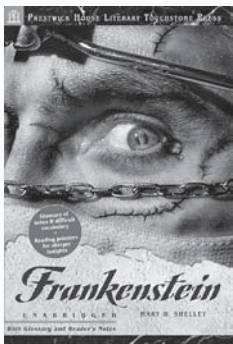
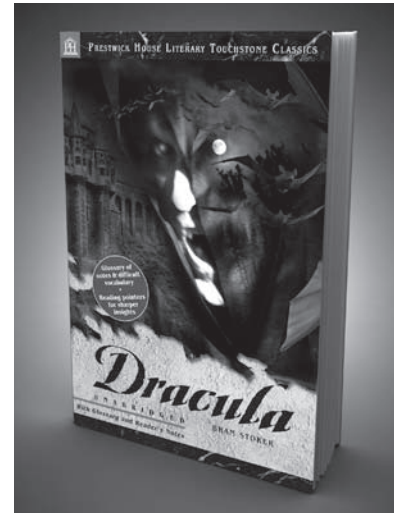
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
